

# Checklist for people from non-EU countries interested in studying

---

## How do I prepare to enter Germany?

### 1. Check conditions

---

- ✓ To be admitted to study, you need a recognised university entrance qualification ("Hochschulzugangsberechtigung") or a recognition of your academic degree.
- ✓ Get more information on universities & degree courses on [www.study-in-germany.de/en/](http://www.study-in-germany.de/en/)
- ✓ Keep in mind the application deadlines of the different universities and the prescribed numerus clausus.



Take a language course: You need sufficient German language skills for your study.

### 2. Visa

---

- ✓ As a citizen of **Australia, Israel, Japan, Canada, the Republic of Korea, New Zealand, United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland** or the **USA** you can enter Germany **without a visa**.
- ✓ The same applies to students from the countries: **Andorra, Brazil, El Salvador, Honduras, Monaco & San Marino**.
- ✓ All other non-EU/EEA nationals require an **entry visa**:
- ✓ Make a timely appointment at the German embassy.
- ✓ Bring the required documents for the visa application. Clarify beforehand the financing of your stay in Germany and bring the proof of financial means to the appointment.



If you stay longer than 3 months, you can apply for the necessary residence permit in Germany.

### 3. Entry / Arrival

---

- ✓ Your entry is sorted out? Book your journey to Germany.
- ✓ **From the first day** of your arrival, you need a valid [health care insurance](#). Take out a travel health insurance in your home country.
- ✓ Take some cash with you to get your first shoppings done.

## Accommodations for students

- ✓ In advance to your arrival in Germany, you have to register for a room in a student residence at the respective student social services (Studierendenwerk) of your university.
- ✓ Look for furnished apartments for subleasing.
- ✓ You didn't find a permanent residence? Try to find German shared flats in online portals.
- ✓ Let your local [Welcome Center](#) help you find an accommodation.
- ✓ Make it in Germany also provides tips on [looking for housing](#).

## 4. Registration of residence / Application of residence permit

---

- ✓ A „reporting obligation“ („**Meldepflicht**“) exists in Germany. You have to register within **2 weeks** with the registration office.
- ✓ Make a timely appointment at the registration office and prepare the required documents: registration form, valid passport, lease or a confirmation from your landlord (“**Wohnungsgeberebscheinigung**“).
- ✓ Make an appointment at the local foreign nationals' registration office. For the appointment you need:
  - filled and signed form
  - valid passport and visa
  - registration certificate
  - proof of financial means
  - valid health care insurance
  - fees up to 260 euros
  - enrollment certificate



Keep in mind, that a hotel address is not accepted everywhere.

## 5. Get settled

---

- ✓ International student groups organise many events for students from abroad.
- ✓ Make new friends in sports clubs or at public events.

## Attachment: important documents at a glance

---

You probably need the following documents down below. We recommend to bring certified copies or original documents (incl. certified translations) with you.

- **Valid Passport / ID**
- **Visa**
- **Credit or debit card**
- **If necessary birth certificate (required for the registration with the registration office)**
- **University entrance qualification („Hochschulzugangsberechtigung“) or your academic degree in original form (neccessary for enrollment)**
- **School-leaving-qualification**
- **Proof of German language skills or a planned participation in a language course**
- **Proof of funding your stay in Germany (for example: salary statements, it's necessary to grant a visa and for the residence permit)**
- **Proof of health insurance**
