# Checklist for people interested in vocational training from non-EU countries

#### How do I prepare to enter Germany?

### 1. Check conditions

- ✓ For vocational training you need: a recognised school-leaving-qualification.
- ✓ Get information on training places at <u>EURES</u>.
- $\checkmark$  If you found a place to study or a place as a trainee, then start applying.

#### 2. Visa

The

Federal Government

- As a citizen of Australia, Israel, Japan, Canada, the Republic of Korea, New Zealand, United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland or the USA you can enter Germany without a visa
- ✓ All other non-EU/EEA nationals require a visa for entry:
- $\checkmark\,$  Make a timely appointment at the German embassy.



✓ Bring the required documents for the visa application. Clearify beforehand the financing of your stay in Germany and bring the proof of financial means to the appointment.

## 3. Entry / Arrival

- ✓ Your entry is sorted out? Book your journey to Germany.
- ✓ From the first day of your arrival, you need a valid <u>health care insurance</u>. Take out a travel health insurance in your home country.
- $\checkmark\,$  Take some cash with you to get your first shoppings done

#### Accomodations for trainees at the beginning

- ✓ Look for furnished appartments for subleasing.
- ✓ You didn't find a permanent residence? Try to find German shared flats in online portals.
- ✓ Let your local Welcome Center help you find an accommodation.
- ✓ Make it in Germany also provides tips on looking for housing.

#### 4. Registration of residence / Application of residence permit

- ✓ A "reporting obligation" ("Meldepflicht") exists in Germany. You have to register within 2 weeks with the registration office.
- ✓ Make a timely appointment at the registration office and prepare the required documents: registration form, valid passport, lease or a confirmation from your landlord ("Wohnungsgeberebscheinigung").
- ✓ Make an appointment at the local foreign nationals' registration office. For the appointment you need:
  - filled and signed form
  - valid passport and visa
  - registration certificate
  - > proof of financial means
  - $\succ$  valid health care insurance
  - ➢ fees up to 260 euros
  - Vocational training contract



Keep in mind, that a hotel adress is not accepted everywhere.

- ✓ Make new friends in sports clubs or at public events.

You probably need the following documents down below. We recommend to bring certified copies or original documents (incl. certified translations) with you.

- Valid Passport / ID
- o Visa
- Credit or debit card
- Birth certificate (required for the registration with the registration office)
- Vocational training contract
- School-leaving-qualification
- Proof of German language skills or a planned participation in a language course
- Proof of funding your stay in Germany (for example: salary statements, it's neccesary to grant a visa and for the residence permit)
- Proof of health insurance
